- Primary legislation Acts
- Secondary legislation Regulations, Directions, Determinations
- Medicines Act 1968
 - Can't do anything series of exemptions
- NHS Act 2006
 - Contrasting provisions for secondary and primary care
- Misuse of Drugs Act 1971
 - Framework Act, detail in 2001 Regulations
 - Supervision of management and use in NHS legislation¹

Medicines vs NHS Legislation (1)

- Patient group directions
 - Medicines legislation criminal offence
 - NHS legislation pharmaceutical services arrangements, eg flu vaccination
- Emergency hormonal contraception
 - Medicines legislation POM to P reclassification 2000
 - Prayed against in both Houses of Parliament
 - Partnership working, minimum standards, guidance and training
 - Now NHS Pharmacy Contraception Service

Medicines vs NHS Legislation (2)

- Dispensing errors
 - Medicines legislation defence to criminal offence if conditions met, eg duty of candour
 - Crown Prosecution Service victims of crime cultural differences
 - Balance public protection and patient safety
 - NHS encourage reporting and learning
 - Hospital chief pharmacist statutory recognition

Controlled drugs

- The law vs myths
 - eg hospitals and digitalisation of drug distribution and storage
- Keeping the law up to date can be slow
 - Balancing HO (harm) and Health (patient care) perspectives
- Managing risk
 - NHS England best practice guidance Health Building Note
 14-2: Medicines storage in clinical areas
 - CQC supports digitalisation; understand basis of enforcement action
 - Risk assessment

NHS Pharmaceutical Services Regulations

- 2005 Regulations so thick the title was printed on the spine
- Mistakes happen
- Contract vs contractual framework
- Issues with wider policies to reduce regulatory burden
